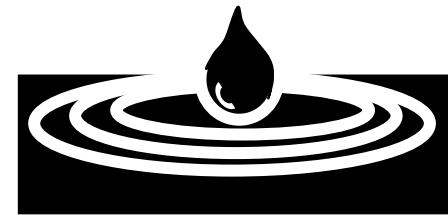


**From the Small
